



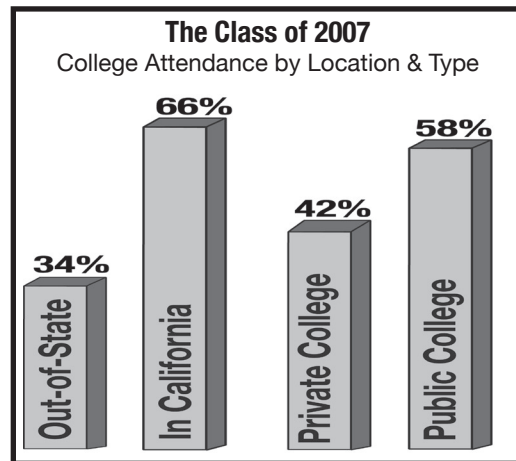

SCHOOL PROFILE

The Villanova Community

Villanova Preparatory is a Catholic, Augustinian, co-educational, day and boarding school set in a rural, tranquil environment, where cultural, ethnic and socioeconomic diversity are welcomed and embraced. Founded in 1924, Villanova remains the only Augustinian Catholic boarding and day school in the United States. Students come to Villanova from 8 countries, including the United States. The total enrollment at Villanova Prep for the 2007-08 academic school year is 314, with 73 students in the senior class. Thirty percent of the student body reside on campus.

In the Augustinian tradition, Villanova Preparatory School's mission is to graduate mature young adults of diverse backgrounds who express to the world the qualities of love, truth and community. These students should think, judge, and act in ways that are sound and in keeping with the teachings of Jesus Christ. We do this by providing a challenging, Catholic, college preparatory environment that promotes the development of mind and heart.

Cross Cultural Learning

The Villanova graduate is a lifelong learner, and a socially active and knowledgeable global citizen. We believe that the diversity in our student body provides a wealth of learning opportunities for students, both inside and outside the classroom. The curriculum in each class seeks to provide opportunities for cross-cultural exchange, in an effort to provide a global education for our students.

Villanova is located in the Ojai Valley, a community of approximately 28,000, 80 miles north of Los Angeles and 30 miles south of Santa Barbara. From the 101 North or South, Highway 33 leads directly to the school.

Residential Life

The residential life program is a supportive and nurturing family environment. It is unusual in that the staff have only one responsibility: caring for the students. Every dorm director is charged with encouraging each student to strive for excellence in all areas of life. A dorm council meets weekly to discuss issues affecting residents, and committees assist the dorm directors in planning activities and events.

A typical school night is structured to provide the students with ample time for study and other activities. Every night before a school day, study hall and independent study, supervised by dorm directors and faculty, are held from 7-10:30 p.m. Residence halls have wireless Internet capability.

In their free time, students can participate in activities and sports, visit family and friends, meet students from other schools, and enjoy the Ventura, Santa Barbara, and Los Angeles metropolitan areas. Villanova provides interesting activities every weekend for its residents, such as mixers, trips to various athletic events, and visits to cultural and educational sites.

Religious Activities

Villanova’s mission as an Augustinian school is to provide a Catholic faith foundation for students who are Catholic and, for those who are not Catholic, an opportunity to grow in an environment where they can establish a relationship with God.

- Religious studies challenge students to explore concepts that shape individual spirituality.
- Campus Ministry actively promotes spiritual growth and moral development.
- Out-of-classroom retreats foster a Christian community within the school.
- School community attends Mass monthly.

Community Service

Remaining true to our Augustinian mission, we seek to establish within our students a lifelong commitment and passion for service to others. Students are required to spend a minimum of 20 hours in service to the community each year. Many of our students will far exceed this expectation, as they become socially responsible members of the community.

Financial Aid:

Villanova is committed to serving students from every economic background. Over 36% of students receive financial support from the school. To apply for financial aid, students must submit an application to the School Scholarship Service. Though Villanova works to assist every qualified student, the school cannot guarantee that every student applying for aid will receive it. In addition to its general financial aid pool, Villanova also offers the following awards and scholarship that are based on demonstrated financial need: Fr. Howard Award: Awarded to qualifying Catholic students who meet admission criteria, show a commitment to the Augustinian core values, and submit a nomination by their parish priest; Fr. Glynn Award: Awarded to students who show a commitment to the Augustinian core values through the admission process; Clare Boothe Luce Scholarship: Awarded to female students who excel in math and science. Villanova also awards competitive scholarships every year that are not based on financial need, including: Merit Scholarships: awarded to students who score in the top 3% in the country on the High School Placement Test; Augustinian Core Values Scholarship: awarded to students scoring at or above the 80th percentile on the HSPT or SSAT who demonstrate academic promise in addition to evidence of a commitment to the Augustinian core values of unity, truth, and love. Villanova Preparatory School offers a rigorous college preparatory curriculum for grades 9-12. Students are encouraged and guided toward full realization of their academic potential through disciplined study and a developed spirit of inquiry. Villanova operates on the semester system and students take seven courses each year. All classes meet a minimum of 4 times a week and the modified block system allows for one extended 80 minute period on most weeks.
